

Artist Bio



Tyson Campbell (Te Rarawa/ Ngāti Maniapoto) is a Narrm/Melbourne based multi-disciplinary artist whose work is engaged with the relationships between the indigenous and settler imaginaries. Tyson is currently researching non-performativity as a way of de-railing and de-legitimising control, discipline and punishment within contractractual agreements of social and financial outcomes of culture. Tyson has exhibited in 'Blakqueer Futurism' at Blak-Dot Gallery (2018), Põuliuli (Faitautusi ma fā'alinga) at Westspace (2017), Emerging Cultural Leaders Exhibition at Footscray Community Arts Centre (2017). In 2017 Tyson has curated three shows including; Disconnection and Reconnection at Blak-Dot gallery, Lobster II at Zambesi Melbourne and High-Pile Low-Pile at Magic Johnston studio. Tyson is also part of the Pacifika collective New-Way Finders. Tyson currently identifies as a Blak Dot Gallery Mokopuna/baby.

Tayla-Rose Kamira Campbell is a proud Te Rarawa and Ngāti Maniapoto Wahine Toa and a recent graduate of Hato Petera College in the North Shore. Kamira's painterly practice investigates Te Ao Māori within the contemporary sphere through various mediums including paint, pencil and collage. Kamira uses her practice to strenghthen her ongoing connection to Whanau, Whakapapa and Whenua as a way of maintaining Hauora. In 2013 to 2014, Kamira represented Tangata Māori in the United Nations Youth Program in Tamaki Makaurau. In 2015, Kamira embarked on a symposium to Washington DC to represent her people in the United National Indian Tribal Youth Gathering where she also met Michele Obama.

Arini Byng works with the affective qualities of materials, gestures and settings - undertaking exercises in image, movement and form to negotiate political scenes.

Byng (born 1987) holds a B. Fine Art from NAS and B. Fine Art (Honours) from VCA. Her work has been exhibited across Australia and internationally including Irene Rose, c3 Contemporary Art Space, Hobiennale, Bus Projects, Slopes, Margaret Lawrence Gallery, Perimeter Presents, ACCA, CCP, MoMA PS1 and The Geffen Contemporary at MOCA; selected works published by Perimeter Editions, Higher Arc, Le Roy and Photofile; and with work held in publication collections of V&A, MoMA, Tate Modern, MONA and NLA. Byng lives and works in Narrm (Melbourne) on the unceded sovereign land of the Wurundjeri people of the Kulin Nation.
